CC - Pd for gas lines to home when home built in 2006. Lines are on sides of home, capped. Does that save money?

- **That should save you quite a bit of money and make the process easier to convert to natural gas.**

DS - The major problem we have is that everything is NEW. Doesn't make sense to get all new appliances, etc. at this time. We would love to have gas lines and replace existing electric things when they NEED replacement. Is that possible to get the lines in knowing we wouldn't replace anything for a few years ??

- **That is possible, and what most will do. It would be in your best interest to install a line to your house for just one appliance that way you'll have the gas line and meter there for when something does fail and needs to be replaced. For example, when your electric water heater fails/starts leaking, you'd be able to replace it with a gas one within a day or so vs. several weeks if we didn't already have a line and meter at your house.**

HS - I had my home (Pre-piped for GAS Just to let you know!!!

- **EXCELLENT!!**

BD - Just need real estimate

Plumber to plumb it out stove now and water heater down the road.

Then cost to run line to home.

- **I should be able to get a couple of local plumbers in there to give multiple estimates if you don't have anybody already in mind. There is no charge on our end to run the gas line up to the home when you install at least one gas appliance.**

JC - My propane tank for logs sits at the right side front corner of the house. The log appliance sits at the right side rear interior corner of the house. The propane line runs I believe inside the house from the storage tank to the appliance. Where would the natural gas meter be installed and would I be responsible for the gas line from the meter to the log appliance. The same question for the meter and line for the water heater sitting inside the garage.

- **This would be a question for the plumber that you would hire to convert to natural gas. With that being said, most propane conversions the natural gas meter would be installed somewhere near where your lines are coming into the house from the propane tank. Many times a plumber can utilize existing propane lines to work with natural gas.**

JL - Will you remove and cart away the old propane tank?

- **Dominion Energy will not, but many times the plumber that you hire to convert your gas lines/appliances will.**

DE - just a quick question? For those of us not interested in gas service will this impact our property or lot in any way? Digging, trenching for pipes, line, etc? If so, what rights as an owner do we have to protect our property from potential damage. Any info would be much appreciated. Thank you.

- **We would stay along road right of way and not enter any customer's private property. We would be running gas under driveways down the streets, but on property that does not belong to the homeowner. We will need the HOA to sign an easement and drawing that we provide before we could begin any installation of these lines.**
